


Museum Science Kits For Classrooms

Exploring Museum Natural Science Kits at home or in your classroom can make learning fun. The museum is pleased to develop and share birdlife kits for second grade students.

The harlequin duck is a small sea duck. It takes its name from Harlequin, a colorfully dressed character in Commedia dell'arte. Harlequin Ducks in winter congregate on rocky shores of the Pacific Northwest and the Northeast's Atlantic coast, including Penobscot bay in Maine. In summer they nest north of Maine along shallow fastmoving rivers and streams, even around rapids and waterfalls, often in forested country. This specimen can be viewed in the museum's duck exhibition.

Thursday, February 2, Groundhog Day

While the Groundhog Day tradition may not be an especially accurate method of weather forecasting (especially in Maine), we are still excited for an opportunity to talk about the noble groundhog, Marmota Monax. Also known as a woodchuck or whistlepig, its association with the arrival of spring comes from the fact that it is a TRUE hibernator! Come look at a ground hog in the museum.

Saturday, February 4, 10 AM Birds That Fish Tour

Tour the museum gallery's birds that fish. With Maine's wetlands and ocean frontage, there are many Maine birds that fish for their food. Look at their different adaptations such as bills and feet that help them fish. Draw your favorite bird fisherman.
